How does living on a small island appeal to you? Japan may be a small country, but it consists of thousands of islands. Shodoshima is one small island filled with beauty. Your life will be filled with happiness and excitement if you choose this island as your destination.

Shodoshima is famous as the "island of olives" but do not underestimate what it has to offer - olives alone are not enough to describe what Shodoshima is all about. The island has "deep" and traditional cultures that are still alive today. The farming and fishing industries, which in ancient times occupied the main part of people's lives, the shrines and temples that met their spiritual needs, and the food culture such as soy sauce and somen noodles, now considered part of ancient history in many parts of Japan, still play an important role in local people's lives, and you will get to experience them if you live here.



A much sought-after destination as a place to settle Among the Japanese, Shodoshima is a popular place to move to for people who are looking for a more relaxed and laid-back lifestyle. Interesting statistics show that approximately 300 people give up city life and move to the island each year. They move here for various reasons - in search of a new challenge or a healthy work-life balance or a better environment for raising children, to name a few. A small but steadily growing number of non-Japanese are also choosing to move here. This is having an invigorating and positive impact on an island whose population is rapidly decreasing.

Shodoshima is blessed with abundant nature. A short drive will take you to one of its many beautiful beaches. The calm Seto Inland Sea with its many small islands may not be suitable for surfing, but rest assured, there are many other activities you can enjoy: sailing, kayaking, standup paddleboarding (SUP) and, of course, swimming. The island offers the ideal surroundings for water sport activities. For those who are keen on hiking, there is no end of trails to choose from. Attractive trekking routes are found throughout the island. One of the most popular hikes is to the summit of Mt. Hoshigajo (816m), the highest peak in the entire Seto Inland Sea. The views of Honshu and Shikoku in the distance are breathtaking.

Easy access to the island

Located almost in the center of the Seto Inland Sea, Shodoshima is easily accessible with five ports connecting it to different parts of Japan and as many as 150 daily ferry connections. Fancy a mini getaway from the island? You can easily access Takamatsu, Okayama, Kobe and Himeji for a one-day or two-day trip.



All the conveniences of modern life

Though Shodoshima is a remote island in Kagawa Prefecture, all the conveniences of modern life are within reach. Supermarkets, drugstores and convenience stores are located around the island and you can get most of your daily needs without having to leave the island. Along with internet shopping, you will find life here as comfortable and convenient as living in a big town.

Pilgrimage culture

Shodoshima has a 1200-year-old pilgrimage culture. This culture was supposedly established along with the local ancient animism fused with Buddhism. Throughout the island you will find Buddhist temples and caves of significant religious importance where the old traditions are still carried on, and many pilgrims, known as Ohenro-san, come from all over the world every year.



Welcoming culture

Shodoshima became a major tourist destination after World War II. To this day, it welcomes approximately 1.1 million visitors every year. As a popular holiday destination, Shodoshima prides itself on its open-mindedness and welcoming attitude towards visitors from outside the island.

We hope that you will try communicating with the locals during your stay; "Konnichiwa" is always a good start! The islanders might surprise you by offering "omotenashi" which could be an invitation to tea or a gift of local fresh fruit.

Life in Shodoshima

Basic Information



Job opportunities

Work is a key part of our lives and you may want to find a job locally. While the choices are limited compared to big cities, Shodoshima does offer a number of job opportunities. As tourism and food manufacturing are two major industries here, these sectors might be a good place to start. The options include hospitality positions at hotels and tourism facilities, employment in soy sauce and somen noodle factories and shops, and the olive industry.



Housing

Shodoshima is a popular destination for people who are looking for a lifestyle change. This has resulted in limited availability of housing that is in relatively good condition. So we suggest that you start looking for property as soon as you consider settling on the island.



Cost of living

The cost of living varies depending on how luxurious or simple a life you want to lead on the island. Whatever your lifestyle, however, the cost of living is much lower than in the big cities. If you are single, for example, you can live on as little as ¥150,000 per month.

Transportation



Shodoshima is big enough to require some form of transport. While public buses and taxis are available, a car or motorbike is essential for everyday use.

Medical Facilities



Shodoshima Chuo Byoin (Shodoshima Central Hospital)

The island's largest general hospital, which opened in 2016, plays a core role in local healthcare services, covering internal medicine, pediatrics, surgery, orthopedics, neurosurgery, dermatology, urology, obstetrics and gynecology, ophthalmology, otolaryngology, rehabilitation, radiology and dialysis.

There are numerous clinics and dentists on the island. For emergencies or complicated medical cases, an air ambulance helicopter is available to transport patients to medical facilities outside the island.



Meet Non-Japanese Residents

Shodoshima-cho has approximately 150 non-Japanese residents. Of all the places they could choose from, why did they end up coming to Shodoshima? We interviewed a few of these Shodoshima fans, asking what brought them here and what they find attractive about the island.

We hope that the interviews will help you get to know the island better and possibly join us here in the future.



Your experiences in Shodoshima

One of the projects I am proud to be part of to this day is making a bench for local seniors who often play Japanese croquet in the morning. One day my friend and I noticed that there was no

bench for them to sit down, so we made one and gave it to them as a gift. This was a turning point for me to get to know the local people.

As I got to know the locals better and we became friends, they started to look after me like a family. One day when we had very stormy weather, one of them came to my house to make sure I was safe. It was a really heartwarming experience.

What brought you to Shodoshima?

I first came to Shodoshima as part of the "Koushi" Project, where a team of people from Taiwan and Hong Kong merge into local life and come up with support projects for locals. After that, I had a chance to work as part of the Setouchi Triennale art festival, and now I have a job at a local olive company.

What reasons would you give for moving to Shodoshima?

The nature, the kindheartedness of the local people, and the simple lifestyle. Life is simple - that was a lesson I have learned from the islanders.



Your experiences in Shodoshima

My interests include outdoor hiking and religion. When I encountered "Ohenro" culture, it dovetailed spot-on with these two interests. After completing the Shikoku Pilgrimage and the Shodoshima version, I realized that there was no comprehensive Shodoshima Ohenro guide or map for English speakers. So I helped create a map and a guide booklet for the Shodoshima Pilgrimage and worshipping at the temples. Another passion I share with my wife is to have guests from overseas at our guest house, Sen Guesthouse. It is a hub for overseas tourists and especially Ohenro walkers.

What brought you to Shodoshima?

What reasons would you give for moving to Shodoshima?

- 1. Great community it is easy to make friends with local old-timers as well as people who have moved here looking for a more relaxed, laid-back lifestyle. Shodoshima has always had people coming and going throughout its history, so perhaps it is used to welcoming newcomers.
- 2. Great potential for starting a business it has approximately 30,000 people, good infrastructure, various event schedules and wide-ranging entertainment, and it is a lively and fun place to live.





You experiences in Shodoshima

Of the various places we have lived, Barcelona was our main base. Coming to Shodoshima was a life-changing experience. Every day is a new adventure.

My days are filled with something that I never had a chance to try when I lived in Barcelona. For example, I now enjoy fishing, kayaking, gardening, and so many other experiences. Surrounded by nature and animals, life here is good. Also, this is a place to experience "real Japan". Traditional soy sauce factories, stone quarrying history, ohenro pilgrimage... All here within reach and I think things are more "exotic" in the countryside like Shodoshima. The downside, if any, is missing out on cultural exposure such as concerts and shopping.
